THIS MONTH: DISTRACTED DRIVING APRIL

This month was all about one of the biggest killers on our roads; distraction. We, and often many others worldwide, recognise April as Distracted Driving Awareness Month.

One of the Five Fatal Factors, distraction, can come in many forms beyond mobile phones. Passengers, the radio, a cheeky couple of chips, and even adjusting the A/C sytem can all cause the driver to take their sole focus off their duty of driving, ultimately dividing their attention.

Lack of attention leads to slower reaction times, travelling blind, and can increase your risk of making errors in judgements you wouldn't otherwise make.



We ask that everyone considers what distractions they might face during their next trip and take steps to avoid them, whether this means eating before taking off, having your A/C system set up already so that you don't have to adjust it, or even asking your passenger to keep the chat to a minimum.





Shattered Windscreens in Wollongong

Police near Wollongong are looking for information on people who may have been involved with a road incident on the night of April 18th.

Mobile phones are obviously one of the largest issues when it comes to driver distraction. Even if you don't pick up your phone, glancing over when those notifications go off still pose a risk.

Looking away from the road for only two seconds while travelling at 60km/h means that you have driven blind for over 30 meters, which is roughly three city buses.
