THIS MONTH: Rural Road Safety Month

This month, we explored Rural Road Safety and some of the unique challenges faced by drivers on rural roads.

Often characterised by long, isolated and unchanging stretches, rural roads can contribute to driver fatigue—especially when combined with the extended travel times typical of rural trips. On the other hand, these same conditions, combined with a lack of traffic and other road users, can create the perception that rural roads are less dangerous a misconception that causes drivers to feel they don't need to be as alert when driving, as they would be in urban areas.

Unfortunately, these factors, and others such as higher speed limits and poor road conditions, continue to contribute to the high-number of rural road-related fatalities occurring annually. In fact, in 2023, rural road deaths accounted for two-thirds of Australian road fatalities.

The facts are, that what ever the reasons, rural roads require just as much vigilance as any other road that you travel on. Next time you are heading out of town, plan your trip and ensure that you are in the best possible condition to drive.

Reform for Ticketless Parking Fines Issued in NSW

The NSW government is developing new legislation regarding councils issuing ticketless parking fines that will be put towards parliament during September.

The new rules will reduce the circumstances that allow for ticketless parking fines in NSW, and will require photo evidence of the vehicle, relevant signage, and notice that a parking offence has been committed and that the offender will be issued a fine. Zones that will still allow for ticketless parking fines, such as national parks that may have limited phone coverage or enclosed facilities that use number plate recognition, will need to have clear signage that drivers are entering a ticketless fine area.

Currently, councils are still able to issue ticketless parking fines, which can cause issues if people are unaware that they have committed an offence and continue to park in the same manner until the first fine arrives.

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
ROAD TIP OF THE MONTH
